You are in the heart of history and we have so many stories to tell you! You'll meet **History Makers** in person, hear from storytellers at **Once Upon A Nation** Storytelling Benches, drill with the **Continental Army** and more.

Whether you have a couple of hours or a couple of days to spend, check out the helpful information in the *Gazette* to help you make the most of your visit. Begin your day at the **Independence Visitor Center**, where you can pick up your free, timed Independence Hall tickets. Seeing the room where our Declaration of Independence was debated and adopted is a must... especially during the month where we celebrate our freedom!

Speaking of celebrating Independence, there are plenty of ways to do it all over the Historic District in July. Check out the **National Constitution Center's** All-American Celebration (see p. 2) and the special events at the **Museum of the American Revolution**, which tell the story of American fight for independence in an interactive and dynamic way.

There's no bigger celebration of America's Birthday than **Wawa Welcome America!** With special events throughout Historic Philadelphia (and beyond), there's something for everyone. See the details on p. 5.

Inside, find everything else you need to know to have a great visit. There's information about **Once Upon A Nation's** amazing **Independence After Hours**, a one-of-a-kind experience that gives you the inside story of the writing of the Declaration (and sneaks you into Independence Hall at night!) and free programs that bring the past to life for the whole family (p. 4), a map (on the back) and lots more valuable information to help make your visit a memorable one.

Some of the most unique and rewarding experiences you'll have in Historic Philadelphia will be meeting Once Upon A Nation's History Makers – people from the past who will share their uniquely interesting stories – and at the Once Upon A Nation Storytelling Benches, where you'll hear little known tales from our nation's early years. From meeting Betsy Ross in her upholstery shop, to marching with the Continental Army in a military muster, to hearing the stirring words of the Declaration read in the shadow of Independence Hall, you're sure to make memories that last a lifetime and become part of your story!



Ride the Philly PHLASH[®]

The Philly PHLASH® Downtown Loop is a visitor-friendly public transit service that provides access to 20 stops located near must-see attractions, museums, and historic sites throughout Philadelphia. The PHLASH is now running daily for the summer season, through September 2, with service to each stop every 15 minutes from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. At just \$2 per ride or \$5 per day, PHLASH is the most affordable way to get around. Children four and under, senior citizens, and SEPTA Key, TrailPass, and TransPass holders always ride free. Passes are available for purchase onboard with exact cash only; online, or at any Visitor Center location.

On July 4, the PHLASH will operate a detoured route and schedule.

Language Services Park maps are available in Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Hebrew, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Polish, Russian and Spanish. The Visitor Center concierge staff is fluent in nine languages including Spanish, French, German and Italian. Information about the Liberty Bell and other park sites is available in multiple languages. See a NPS Ranger or the Visitor Center staff if you have a specific request.

Accessibility for the hearing impaired, a portable loop system is available inside the Visitor Center, compatible with all telecoil equipped hearing aids, cochlear implants, and induction loop receivers.

A receiver with headphones is also available if a hearing aid is not compatible. Curb cuts are at corners on perimeter sidewalks. All major sites have ramps. Photo albums with pictures of 2nd floor exhibits are available. Audio description of exhibits & AV are at Poe and Kosciuszko Houses, NPS Rangers describe exhibits elsewhere.
