

The idea for the joint effort came from Ed Rendell, former mayor and governor.








Seven museums and sites in Philadelphia's historic district have agreed to donate all proceeds from admissions tickets bought on Saturday, March 19 to support the activities of UNICEF in Ukraine.

The idea for collaborating with the historic sites originated with former mayor and governor Ed Rendell, who will participate in a press announcement Wednesday at Independence Visitor Center.




